

Dear Secretary of State

We are writing to seek urgent assistance in relation to meat export opportunities to Australia.

As you will be well aware, the UK has reached a comprehensive free trade agreement which has granted Australia significant duty-free quota volumes of beef and sheep meat. This has been a source of considerable consternation among UK farmers on the basis that these volumes are a potential threat to the stability of the domestic market with the risk that these products undercut domestic livestock prices.

Notwithstanding this, our members are always looking proactively for business opportunities and seeing if they can also benefit reciprocally. There are UK operators in Australia right now trying to do this and they have indeed identified opportunities to export beef products to that market only to find that they are unable do to so as currently Australia will not permit the import of UK beef or sheep meat without undertaking a protracted approval process which, put simply, means that Australia considers UK beef and lamb not safe to import unless and until we prove otherwise.

Conversely, as part of the Border Target Operating Model, the UK has listed Australian Lamb as 'low risk' meaning that they do not even need to provide an export health certificate (EHC) and their beef as 'medium risk' where the UK's new simplified EHC can be used. Most importantly, the UK has granted this unilaterally without requiring that Australia go through any sort of country or site approval process and without any attempt at trying to secure reciprocity.

We would ask that this is addressed urgently and that the Government requests that Australia reciprocates and allows the import of UK beef and lamb without preconditions. If needed this can be done on the basis of pre-listing, allowing trade to commence with audits taking place later and regularly thereafter in the normal manner. Again, we feel UK farmers would be deeply concerned if it emerged that we are prepared to import Australian meat and meat products without restriction but are unable to export to that market despite there being an FTA.

These business opportunities require speedy action without which competitors from other countries will take the business so we would ask for a response by return assuring us that immediate steps will be taken to ensure that the UK can ship meat and meat products to Australia without delay.
